GOOD NEWS IN A BAD NEWS WORLD: THE MINISTRY OF CONGREGATIONAL CARE



In this day and age, when there is so much negativity on the news, on the internet and in our everyday lives, it's hard not to become cynical and to develop an attitude of "looking out for #1". It becomes an accepted way of life to be self-protective and self-centered, focusing on personal wants and needs thus spending less time and effort attending to the needs of others. As disciples of Christ though, we have a higher calling, to rise above the standards of the world around us, and think less of ourselves as

we tend to the needs of those that Jesus has placed in our care. *"Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality."* Romans 12:10-13

Jesus exemplified this message of servanthood and caring when he knelt to wash his disciples' feet. (John 13:1-16) On his last night with his disciples, the Lord of the universe humbled himself, put aside his own concerns and cares, and served his friends by washing away the dirt and grime on their feet. In the process, he showed them exactly what he expected of them; to become true servants and continue this work in his name.

Just as the disciples were taught to serve others, we as Christ followers are also meant to reach out and care for those around us. In a world that seems so dark and uncaring, the church is to be that bright spot where people know they are loved and cared for because they are beloved children of God. James A. Harnisch writes in "A Disciple's Path": *"God continues to call the church to be the primary means by which God is at work to transform the kingdoms of this earth into the kingdom of God. To be more specific, God intends for the congregation of which you are a part to be the tangible expression of Christ's presence in your community"*

The work of the Caring Ministry of this church is continuing to grow and

evolve as we now have Marion Methodist Care Ministers who will be coming alongside to visit our members in their homes, in the care centers and in those times of their lives when they need the love and support of the church. Many of them will be reaching out to you when you are in a time of grieving, following the loss of loved one. Or perhaps you may be recuperating following surgery in your home or in a care center. A Marion Methodist Care Minister will be visiting with you, sending cards, perhaps calling or emailing during your recovery to extend the love of Jesus Christ through members of his church.

The Care Ministers have been through classes and training since last September and will continue to expand their understanding of a caring ministry as they serve the people of Marion Methodist. They will join many, many of our members who every day are sending cards, making phone calls, taking meals to one another, and helping out when times are hard. It is not the responsibility of one individual or a group of individuals, but the entire church to reach out and care for each other at all times.

In addition to all the physical ways in which we meet each other's needs, the most important is to be in prayer with and for each other. The strength of a church, of any community of people, is their reliance on prayer to guide and direct their every moment as followers of Jesus Christ. The Marion Methodist Care Ministers have been praying together since the classes began last fall, for concerns that have happened in their lives, but also for the concerns of our church and beyond. In their ministry to you, they will be your companion in prayer, to share those things that are on your hearts and lift them up in prayer. As our entire congregation continues to grow and reach out to each other, our community and beyond, to Haiti and the far reaches of the globe, may we ground everything we do in prayer, with a caring heart and the love of Jesus to guide us in all that we do.

"Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, and humility, gentleness and patience. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity." Colossians 3:12, 14.

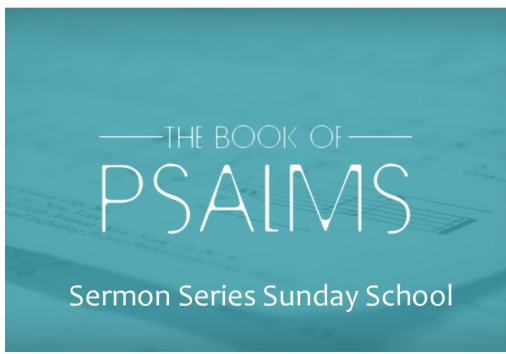

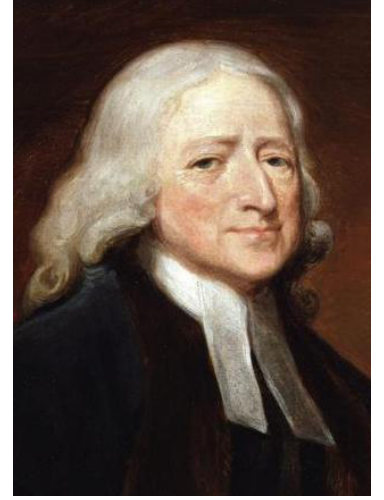

Seven of John Wesley's Practices Can Change Hearts Today

As a priest in the Church of England, John Wesley was distraught by the powerlessness of the church to reach the vast majority of British people. God's spirit created such a holy discontent in Wesley's heart that he abandoned conventional modes of ministry and experimented with several innovative approaches. To everyone's surprise, spiritual revival broke out in England and beyond. If you're like me, you may wonder, "If God could do that then, why not now?"



Seven practices emerged as characteristic of the early Methodist movement. (#6 and 7)

6. Give the Ministry to the Laity

A team member who rides the bench and a Christian who sits in a pew share an eerie similarity — they both watch other people play. Christianity was never designed to be a spectator sport. As the early Methodist movement grew rapidly, Wesley soon took his mother's advice and allowed laypersons, both men and women, to oversee classes (small groups) and preach in the society meetings (large groups). When he released the energies of the laity, the ministry multiplied even faster.

7. Use Mass Communication to Get the Word Out

In Wesley's day, the mass communication tool was the printing press. Wesley wrote numerous sermons, treatises, tracts, and books that were distributed to a wide audience to fuel the movement. Thousands of people who never heard him speak came to know Christ and grow in Christ through his writings. Of course, today the Internet and social media enable anyone with web access to have a personal platform previously unimaginable.

Why Not Now?

The genius of the Wesleyan revival is found in the ways he engaged coldly indifferent people and turned them into warm-hearted disciples who changed the world. We can do that, too. We can recover the seven methods of the early Methodist movement that reached the unchurched masses of that day. If we will reshape these practices for a twenty-first century context and retool receptive individuals, groups, and churches to use them, a new wave of the spirit will be released

Shaking Up Summer Sunday School

This summer we will be having a children's church format during the 9:45 service, just like last year. All of our children will attend church with their family and then when it is time for the sermon, volunteers will take them to their classrooms. This will give the children a break from regular Sunday School while still getting the Christian message in an enjoyable way and also provide them with the opportunity to worship with their family. Our preschoolers, 3 year olds to 5 year olds who have not completed kindergarten, will be taken to room 205 where they will share a Bible Story and then have time for some fun with their church peers. We will even go outside to the playground if it is nice weather.

Our elementary children, those who have completed Kindergarten – 4th grade, will be taken to 3rd floor, rooms 303/305 and the video room. They will have a short video lesson and then do activities such as games or crafts.

All children will be picked up after the service in the appropriate rooms. Of course, our nursery will still be available for preschool children for the full service.

Can you help?

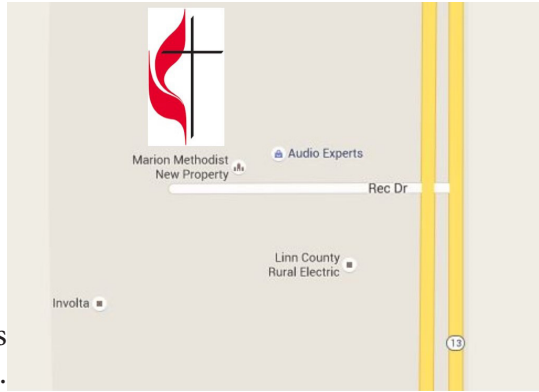

What's Next?

More than Just a Building

All of us enjoy watching a project get constructed. Driving by a construction site and watching things change from day to day brings us a sense of satisfaction and fulfillment. We guess at what the building will be and try to predict when the job will be completed. In the case of our new church building, we already know what it will be and we have a sense of when it will be completed. But we now have the opportunity to be involved in understanding all that goes into the planning and construction of our new church.

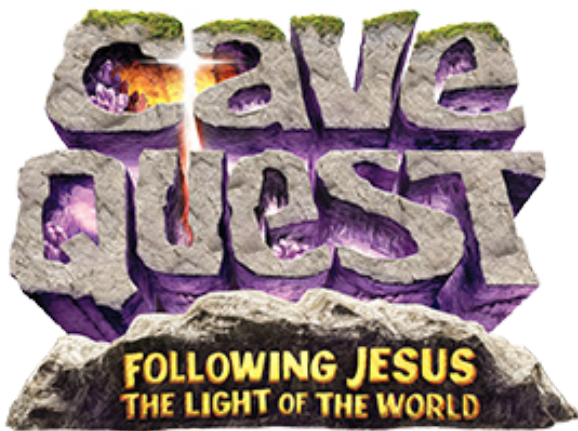


Long before the first load of concrete is poured, the first wall is constructed, or any of the lights are turned on, site infrastructure needs to be addressed. The building will need adequate infrastructure to be in place. This includes water, sewer, power, gas, storm sewer, fiber optic, phone lines, cable, and other services. We are responsible for constructing all of these utilities and extending them across our property to our new building. This makes sense to us as we will be the ones using these utilities. But what about site access? What about access for people and their vehicles? How will we get to the building and what is our financial responsibility?

The roadways and parking lots that will be on our property and utilized by the congregation will, of course, be our responsibility to pay for and construct. But, we also have a further responsibility, as do all developers in the City of Marion, to improve the streets and sidewalks adjacent to our property. In our case, this means REC Drive, 35th Ave. and Highway 13. We will be responsible to improve the north half of REC Drive, the south half of 35th Ave. and our engineer is currently conducting a traffic study to determine if a turning/deceleration lane will be necessary on Highway 13 on the east side of our property. We will also be financially responsible for an 8-foot wide concrete trail on the north side of the property. These are all requirements of the City of Marion and the Iowa Department of Transportation and we have accounted for the cost of all of these improvements in our building budget. We are still uncertain of the timing of these improvements, so our plan is to keep these in our budget until the time we are required to complete the improvements. Keep your eyes open as you drive by our new property and know that there will be a lot of underground work that will take place before the new church starts to take shape.
