Simple to say, Important to do

"Our Time Has come!" screamed her T-Shirt.

I had no idea what that was all about, but as I ate my eggs and hash browns in the next booth at the Drake Diner, it soon became apparent. She was in town to cheer on her daughter, a player for the University of Georgia Bulldogs, in the NCAA regional basketball tournament.

The slogan on the team shirt was intriguing. It is likely true that the girls from Georgia had been playing ball since they were very small. As Division 1 players, they had certainly committed themselves to a year round regimen of lifting weights, shooting free throws, running drills, etc. yet, that did not mean they were going to be handed the NCAA Basketball Championship trophy, regardless of what their parents shirts proclaimed.

Their will did not make it their time, there were other factors involved (most notably the University of Tennessee, Connecticut and Stanford) that would provide major obstacles to "their time" actually coming. No one was going to concede a game to Georgia because the marketing department had proclaimed it to be "time" for the Bulldogs to win. Simple to say, now it was important for the Bulldogs to do the work of making their time come.

In many ways the rallying cry of the church of Jesus could be "Our time has come." Unlike the marketing department of a college who simply wants it to be our time or needs a catchy slogan for a tournament T-shirt we can proclaim this because

the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, Jesus himself, has proclaimed it. He says: "be sure of this: The kingdom of God has come near." (Luke 10:11) and "The kingdom of God is in your midst." (Luke 17:21).

Ponder this for a moment, a basketball team can make their time come, all they need to do is score more points than all of their opponents, but can the church of Jesus make his time come? Great theologians have tossed this question around for generations and I prefer the answer of William James who wrote: "we cannot make the Kingdom of God come yet during our lives we should labor and live as if we could."

James notion resonates with who we have been and are seeking to become as Christians and as a church. Recently we adopted the statement: The mission of the Church is to make Disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world as the guiding principle of First United Methodist Church of Marion. This statement makes the case that we have a role in the time of Christ. Jesus instructs us to in the Great Commission found in Matthew 28 to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Primary to that mission is proclaiming the good news of God's grace. Again, the words of Jesus in what is known as the Great Commandment

(found in Matthew 22) is our best guide "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind." and "Love your neighbor as yourself." That is to say, it is our mission to respond to God by offering grace to the world.

We have done the easy work – created new logos, adopted a new mission statement – it has all been relatively easy to say, now it is important to "do" our mission. The United Methodist **Book of Discipline** says it this way: "John Wesley, Phillip Otterbein, Jacob Albright and our other spiritual forbears understood this mission in this way. Whenever United Methodism has had a clear sense of mission, God has used our Church to save persons, heal relationships, transform social structures, and spread scriptural holiness, thereby changing the world. In order to be truly alive, we embrace Jesus' mandate to love God and to love our neighbor and make disciples of all peoples."

It is doable and that is where we plug in – the conditions are all present – in that the Spirit is willing and we are here now. Simple to say, now it is important for us Christians to do the work of making our time intersect with the Kingdom of God already present. That is my plan for the rest of my life because in a deep and authentic way and for the most glorious purpose of all the building of God's Kingdom "our time has come."



A Life Saving Opportunity Thursday, August 29, 2013

We at FUMC have an opportunity to help save someone's life on Thursday, August 29, 2013. How you say? We will be hosting a blood donor drive from 3:00 pm to 6:00 pm in the Fellowship Hall. You can look forward to some outstanding Methodist cookies after giving blood! A few facts about donation and the use of blood:

- One donation can help save up to three lives
- Every year in the United States, four million people receive blood transfusions
- One out of five people entering the hospital will need blood
- Every two seconds, someone needs blood
- You may only donate blood every 56 days
- Cancer patients use 19% of our community blood supply
- Heart disease patients use 16% of our community blood supply
- Typically there is a 20% drop in donations between Memorial Day and Labor Day, but the need doesn't go away.
- Red Blood Cells transport oxygen to the cells in the body. They are typically transfused to a patient within 20-30 days after donation.
- Red Blood Cells are transfused due to blood loss from trauma, surgical procedures, or in cancer patients because of chemotherapy.
- Plasma supports blood clotting to prevent or stop bleeding and can be stored in a frozen state for up to one year.
 Plasma is transfused in cases of heavy bleeding like open heart surgery
- and hemophilia, to help promote clotting and stop bleeding.

 Platelets begin the blood clotting process in the body, but have a shelf-life of
- only 5 days, so they are tested and transported for transfusion immediately.

 Platelets are often given to cancer patients, AIDS patients, and organ
- transplant patients to help prevent massive blood loss.
 Your blood is drawn while you relax in a reclined position. All supplies are sterile and used only once before being discarded. The donation process itself takes about 5 to 10 minutes, but plan on about 45 minutes from walking in to leaving.

Attending school is the best way for children in foreign countries to avoid being victims of Human Trafficking.

Please take even just a small step and visit our Fair Trade "shop". And then consider purchasing an item or 2 or 3 items that are FAIR TRADE on a regular basis. Look for the FAIR TRADE symbol when you are purchasing especially chocolate, coffee and tea.
